

W1- THE ACUTELY DETERIORATING PATIENT

One in a series of four workshops exploring the management of the deteriorating patient

OVERVIEW: This workshop is one of a series that will be conducted between April 2011 and 2013 under the Rural Health Continuing Education (Stream 1) project entitled *“Using simulation and the theme of the deteriorating patient to develop skills and training capacity in rural and remote multi-professional teams”*.

WORKSHOP OBJECTIVES

To provide up to date training for rural specialists in the recognition and management of the deteriorating and unstable patient.

TARGET AUDIENCE

Specialists and accompanying nursing staff who recognize and manage the patients with potential to deteriorate within regional, rural and remote hospitals in Australia.

DESCRIPTION

This workshop presents a structured clinical approach to the problem. Using a case-based format, indicative clinical problems will include cardiac arrest, coma, respiratory distress, shock and allergy. The workshop will introduce participants to the principles of ‘track and trigger’ observation charts and systems approaches to escalation of treatment to match severity of deterioration. Managing the deteriorating patient with focus on management in the rural setting including transport, retrieval, limited assistance and limited investigations. Practical and procedural skills will address resuscitation, airway and ventilation strategies and cardiovascular support. Basic team skills presented will address team-leader, role allocation and team communication.

CPD POINTS: Dependent upon college CPD program. Generally qualifies as hands-on interactive workshop. E.g. ANZCA Category 3, Level 2

ELIGIBILITY

1. Doctors working in rural, regional and remote areas within Australia (including Darwin and Townsville) who have specialist recognition. This includes fellows of colleges affiliated with the CPMC (See APPENDIX 1) and other doctors clearly providing specialist services in regional, rural and remote areas. 2. Non-specialist medical practitioners who have significant roles in other participating specialists' practices and who are recommended by a specialist colleague, for example career medical officers (Places limited). 3. Metropolitan practitioners who provide substantial services to the rural sector. 4. Limited numbers of specialists' multi professional teams. Specialists wishing to invite nursing colleagues should phone the Admin Officer. Fellows of the RACGP and ACRRM may be able to use funding available to them under alternative rural funding schemes to participate in this program if places are available. If unsure, contact the project officer.

ADDITIONAL WORKSHOPS IN THE RHCE SIMULATION PROGRAM

The whole project comprises two parts:

Upskilling Workshops

Firstly, a series of up-skilling workshops which includes three train the trainer workshops and four clinical up-skilling workshops the latter focusing on different aspects of the topic 'recognition and management of the deteriorating patient'.

W1 Recognition and management of the acutely deteriorating patient

W2 Communicating with colleagues and patients

W3 Preventing errors and managing crises during procedural care

W4 Managing the critically obstructed airway

Eligible specialists and others are encouraged to apply for any or all of these workshops as individual practitioners.

Workshops hosted from rural facilities

Secondly, up to ten specialists may apply to host a clinical up-skilling workshop from their rural

Hospitals facilities with the assistance of the SCSSC project team. Assistance will include: (1) initial consultation with the rural specialists' teams to identify specific training needs; provision of training content and instructors'

materials, evaluation methods, equipment inventories and other resources for the workshops (3) assistance with technical and other preparation in the months prior to the workshops (4) buddying-in from clinical educators to deliver the workshops at the rural facilities and (4) other project management including administration, business management, workshop evaluation and reporting. It is expected that courses hosted in rural centers will be workshops 1-4 however applications will be considered individually and original or varied course formats may be considered.
